Elders Speak Up / Les paroles des aînées

Seniors make up the fastest growing age group in almost every country. Canada is no exception. In 2010, an estimated 4.8 million Canadians were 65 years of age or older, a number that will double in the next 5 years. By 2051 about one in 4 Canadians is expected to be 65 or over. Our aging population presents our governments with challenges that need to be addressed today and yet there has been very little meaningful consultations while decisions are being taken on immigration, pensions and Old Age Security that will have consequences for many families from the cultural communities. Elders from the South Asian communities, like members at SAWCC, are drawn from the broad spectrum and diversity of class, culture, religion and languages of South Asia.

Not knowing either of the official languages, being socially or economically dependent, experiencing cultural shock and being members of the visible minority are situations that can lead to isolation, marginalization and exploitation of elders. SAWCC has always included elders in their activities. They are welcomed and continue to participate in the Eng-

lish and French classes offered all year round; they attend the potlucks at the end of the month and the information sessions and crafts classes (sometimes even as instructors) offered at the centre. (Cont'd on pg 5)

ORGANIZATIONS LAUNCH CAMPAIGN OF NON-COOPERATION WITH CANADIAN SPY AGENCY:
"DON'T TALK, DON'T LISTEN" TO CSIS

Montreal, 29 Jan. '12 -- Almost 70 organizations have joined a call to end all cooperation with Canada's spy agency, the Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS). Montreal-based People's Commission Network initiated the public campaign of total non-cooperation with CSIS at a press conference today. The organizations advise their members to neither speak nor listen to CSIS agents.

"For far too long we have tolerated the unacceptable activities of CSIS, whether through a false sense of loyalty or fear. We are here today to say that we will no longer voluntarily cooperate with CSIS when its agents come knocking on our doors or show up unannounced at our workplaces. We will not put ourselves, our neighbours, our friends, our families here or overseas, our organizations and our work for justice at risk by speaking with or listening to CSIS agents. We will say no to CSIS and yes to freedom from fear and political con-

trol," said Marie-Eve Lamy, active in the People's Commission Network.

Over the last decade, CSIS's budget has increased by 140%, reaching \$430 million in 2009. In 2010, the agency maintained almost 3000 employees. It also had informationsharing agreement with 147 countries. CSIS has been heavily involved in several Canadian cases of rendition to torture but has emerged from these and other scandals unscathed, protected by a broad mandate, laws assuring the secrecy of its operations, and lack of any real accountability. "By questioning Arabs about their political views and about each other, and by implying that pro-Palestinian and anti-colonial perspectives are suspect, CSIS has in the past succeeded in sowing fear and silencing support for justice and freedom in the Middle East," said Amy Darwish, an organizer with Tadamon! Montreal, which works for justice in the Middle East.

"Intelligence agencies have a tendency to view union activists as subversives; we cannot encourage informing, nor passing on information that could be used against people whose only fault is to want to have their rights recognized," said Francis Lagacé, vice-President of the Conseil central du Montréal métropolitain de la CSN. "CSIS tactics create fear and isolation in our communities, particularly immigrant communities. In the face of their intimidation and racial profiling, migrant justice groups are responding with weapons of solidarity and support, aiming to render CSIS ineffective with a campaign of noncollaboration, while also supporting individuals pressured by CSIS during the immigration process," said Jaggi Singh, a member of Solidarity Across Borders. "Migrants, refugees, women in crisis are already insecure. CSIS exploits them, preying on their vulnerability. With this campaign of noncollaboration, we convey to them they are not alone; there are many of us working in solidarity to protect our communities; to protect one another," said Dolores Chew, on behalf of SAWCC. The People's Commission and its allies will hold a series of activities in the coming months to highlight CSIS abuse and break the fear and isolation among those targeted.

Healthy Eating / Manger santé—Muffins.

Chocolate Chip Banana Muffins

Ingredients:

Egg 1
Butter/margarine ¼ C
Sugar 3/4C
Flour 1 ½ C
Baking soda 1 tsp,
Bananas mashed (3) or1 C

Chocolate chips $\frac{1}{2}$ C Salt1 pinch. Walnuts (coarsely chopped and toasted) 1/2 C

Method:

Pre- heat oven to 350 F. Grease 12 muffin cups (muffin tray), or line with muffin liners. Beat egg, butter or



margarine and sugar till fluffy. Blend in mashed bananas. Sift flour, salt and

baking soda together. Add flour to the egg mixture. Lastly mix in the chocolate chips. Spoon batter in muffin cups. The batter will be quite thick. Bake in a preheated oven for 20-25 minutes. Cool 5 minutes before removing from the pan.. (Courtesy of Juveria)
